End of Year Trip

Our Tuuii whaanau were ready to head out to the Mangere Outdoor pools, rain or shine this week to celebrate the end of the year as a tumeke whaanau! Although the weather was gloomy our spirits were high and we all had a blast. We are extremely grateful to all our whaanau who were able to join us. We wish all our year 4 students the best as they move into our senior school and look forward to making more memories with our Tuuii whaanau in 2023.











This term we've always looked forward to Tuesdays when tamariki have had swimming lessons. The instructors were really impressed with everybody's progress! To finish the programme students got to practise different techniques when having to evacuate a boat in an emergency. They practised leaping in the water with life jackets on and what to do in a large group once in the water. So much practical learning as well as fun! Thanks to the awesome instructors.



We used the Football World cup as an opportunity to learn about different countries and create art. Each child randomly picked one of the teams represented at the tournament. They then researched and made an information slide about the country. They also created the footballer on the team using wire, paper mache, and paint - we looked at different positions and the way a body moves during football to make them look like they were moving.



Over the last few weeks. they have been learning all about Area in maths. Having been inspired by the Rainbows End trip, the students have set about mapping out a theme park by drawing out the areas and measuring this in metres squared before calculating the cost with each building/ride which is \$200 per square metre and every outside feature (path, tree, car park) costing \$100 per square metre.



They have been working hard to make sure that this comes under their \$1,000,000 budget before they started constructing a 3D model. As part of their Inquiry, they have also been learning about different types of weather and have recreated a water cycle.

Room 13

Room 13 combined art and writing by sharing what our summer holidays will look like. Students got to choose what kind of sunglasses they preferred and had to draw a self-portrait that is in proportion with the glasses. Inside the glasses, they had to write what they will be doing on their holidays.



We had a look at what a memoir is. We wrote our own one-liner memoir to inspire or motivate others and illustrated it.
